Letter from the Director - April 27, 2021

As the 2020-2021 academic year is swiftly coming to an end, it is a delight to share that at our department end of year meeting this afternoon, four highly deserving students received academic excellence in Jewish Studies awards (for named awards and recipients, see below). This ray of sunshine comes while we continue to navigate through the myriad challenges of the pandemic.

We shifted to online teaching in March 2020, but despite our remote interactions with students, we have managed to keep our academic standards high, and our spirits filled with optimism for a brighter future. In spring 2020, we introduced a new course to our curriculum, team-taught with Dr. James McLaughlin from the Department of Education. This interdisciplinary course titled "Learning and Teaching About the Holocaust" will be taught annually, including a spring break field study to the Auschwitz Birkenau concentration camps and Krakow Poland (our 2020 field study was cancelled just two days prior to our planned departure). While all international field studies have been put on hold, we are optimistic that in spring 2022, our new group will be able to travel to Poland for this transformative immersion experience.

In summer 2020, I was selected as Scholar in Residence at the Oxford University Institute for The Study of Global Antisemitism and Policy. Due to Covid, the weeklong program was moved online, which did not minimize its impact on me and the other participants. The virtual program also provided a couple of spots for students, and upon my recommendation, Karen Gutensohn (22') joined this great learning opportunity. We had an incredible schedule of lectures by eminent scholars, and activities that challenged us to deepen and refine our understanding of this centuries-old virus and its newest forms and manifestations. It was a most rewarding intellectual and personal learning experience from which I continue to draw upon in my teaching.

In closing, on behalf of the Jewish Studies Program, a warm Mazel Tov to our graduating seniors! May you go from strength to strength!

Thank you to our supportive alumni and friends of the Jewish Studies Program at Rollins College. We hope to stay in touch in the coming academic year.

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

Jewish Life and Thought - Spring 2021

Never Again: A Commemoration of the Holocaust (Yom HaShoah)

On April 8th, 2021, Rollins hosted a Holocaust memorial at the Rice Family Pavillion. Community members were also invited to attend virtually.

The event included student speakers, a reading by a published poet, the lighting of yahrzeit (memorial) candles, a recitation of the Kaddish and another Jewish prayer for mourning, the reading of children's names who were in Auschwitz-Birkenau, and a moment of silence. The event was sponsored by Rollins Hillel, the Office of Religious and Spiritual Life, the Education Department, and the Jewish Studies Program.

About The Program

Jewish studies is the investigation of the Religion, history, and culture of the Jewish people and the study of the interaction of this culture with the civilizations of the world.

This program in Jewish studies at Rollins College identifies and combines courses in the departments of Philosophy and Religion, English, Foreign Languages, Art, Music, and Anthropology. Time periods and geographical areas covered range from ancient Israel

to contemporary American Society. The multidisciplinary approach of the program includes biblical studies, art, music, archeology, literature, women's studies, and philosophy.

Who in particular would benefit from this Jewish Studies minor?

The Jewish Studies minor may be particularly beneficial for students interested in graduate studies in Religious Studies, International Politics, History, Comparative Literature, Foreign Languages, Classics and Ancient Mediterranean Studies.

In addition, the Jewish Studies Minor serves students who pursue the fields of education, social work, communal service, public administration, law, foreign service, the ministry and/or the rabbinate.

What other benefits does the program have to offer students?

Study Abroad programs at the school for overseas students at Tel Aviv University; January and/or May Field Study Courses in Israel; Summer Archaeological digs in Israel; Jewish Studies Center in Prague.

Service learning and internships in such local institutions as the Hebrew Day School, Sunday Schools, The Holocaust Education and Resource Center; The Jewish Community Center; Jewish Family service, and Kinneret, a Jewish home for the aged. Students seeking advice about this interdisciplinary program may contact Dr. Yudit K. Greenberg, Director.

What greathe course requirements for this minor?

Six courses are required for a minor in Jewish Studies: 2 core courses, 3 electives, and a senior independent study research paper.
