NEW INSTRUCTOR/NEW COURSE

INSTRUCTOR: Sam Stark, former CEO FL Sports Commission

TITLE: Business of Sports

DESCRIPTION: Sports is a business. A big business. Begin to understand “why” and “how” sports business works throughout the world, in the US and in Central Florida. Sam Stark, Chief Marketing & Community Relations Officer at Rollins College and CEO of the Central Florida Sports Commission and the founding Executive Director of the Chicago Sports Commission, will lead conversations with sports executives and leaders about their experiences and challenges. Guests will come from groups such as the Orlando Magic, USTA, Florida Citrus Sports, Central Florida Sports Commission and Arnold Palmer Invitational.

Representative works may include selections by W. B. Yeats, Georgia O’Keefe, T. S. Eliot, Igor Stravinsky, Zora Neale Hurston, John Cage, Benjamin Britten, Jacob Lawrence, Tim O’Brien and Maya Lin.
